Teddy is an elderly collie dog who was thrown out on the streets. He found his way here and spent days trying to get in the gate. We were trying to feed him outside but noticed that he was having problems with his mouth. It appears that most of his lower teeth were removed when he was younger which has now led to problems with his bottom teeth. He has a very bad infection in his mouth and can only eat soft food. We have taken him in and he is on a course of antibiotics. The vet will have a closer look in his mouth when he is under anaesthetic to be neutered and it will be decided what treatment will follow.

Tony found Sasha and Tasha at the landfill site. Both young pups were very skinny and full of parasites.

We were doing our rounds of feeding the dogs on the streets,

Sadie would go missing for days on end and we would be unable to find her. Each time she reappeared she looked worse than the last time we saw her. At one time we couldn't get anywhere near her and she would growl, but one night

when we spotted a mum with two tiny babies on a busy road. The mum clambered up the mountain to where she had the other pups in the forest. We picked up the two pups which were maybe 5 weeks old. We then had to make the hard decision to get up the mountain to take the other pups. The little ones on the road must have followed her down and were unable to get back up and there is no doubt that the others would soon start to follow her and either fall and die or get killed on the road. There were three girls and 1 boy. The girls were named Tammy, Breanne and Luca and the boy was named Rascal. Tony and the boys were in the town centre when they spotted three pups, about 12 weeks old, running about in a panic. The pups were unused to people so they did have quite a job catching them. The three girls are called Kiki, Hana and Tilly.

We found Sandi on her own in the town centre. She was very thin, hungry and dehydrated.

Liam was sat on some steps nearby when a young pup (Milly) ran up and tried to grab some food that he had. He shared his food with her, then brought her home.

We were outside fitting collars on dogs going for adoption when we heard a young pup crying across the road. She was trying to get under the fence from the field to get across to us. Luke went and got the pup. We have no idea where she came from or how she found us. We called her Destiny.

Freddy is a tiny pup that Kerry and Kosta found in a village. He was thin and dehydrated. Freddy has a very sore skin condition caused by a flea allergy.

we found her in the dark and it was as if she was asking for help. She let Tony fuss her then came and put her head on me. She only gave a slight whimper when Tony picked her up and put her in the van. She is now at home, doing well.

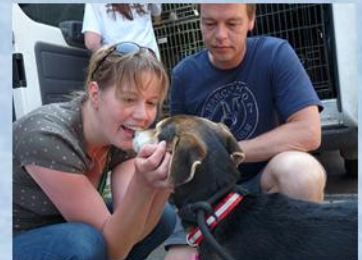
